FUENTES: Here. 7 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Herb Garten? 8 MR. GARTEN: Here. CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: David Hall? 9 10 MR. HALL: Here. 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Mike McKay? 12 MR. McKAY: Present. 13 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Tom Meites? 14 (No response.) 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: I thought Tom had joined the call. 16 17 MR. MEITES: Here. CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And this is Frank

- 1 MS. SINGLETON: Yes.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Jonann Chiles?
- 3 MS. CHILES: Yes, I'm here.
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Sorry, Jonann. I was
- 5 calling that alphabetically, except that list I was
- 6 using didn't have you at the right place in the
- 7 alphabet.
- 8 MS. CHILES: You got to me; I'm fine.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay, good.
- 10 A PARTICIPANT: I move that we make that
- 11 correction promptly.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Well, let
- 13 me call to order, then, a special meeting of the Board
- 14 of Directors of the Legal Services Corporation for
- November 27, 2006, pursuant to a notice published in
- 16 the Federal Register.
- And the first item of business is to approve
- 18 the agenda. Has everyone seen and had an opportunity
- 19 to look at the agenda?
- MR. GARTEN: So moved, Herb Garten.
- 21 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Move the approval of
- the agenda?

- 1 MR. GARTEN: So moved, Herb Garten.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Aye. Is there a
- 3 second?
- 4 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: Second, Lillian
- 5 BeVier.
- 6 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Those in favor, please
- 7 say aye.
- 8 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Aye. Those opposed,
- 10 nay.
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 OPERATOR: Excuse me, Bernice Phillips joins.
- 13 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Bernice,
- 14 welcome. We're glad you could join us.
- MS. PHILLIPS: Thank you. Hey, everybody.
- 16 A PARTICIPANT: Hello, Bernice.
- 17 A PARTICIPANT: Hi, Bernice.
- 18 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: We just called the roll
- 19 and you didn't answer then, but we know you're on the
- 20 line now.
- MS. PHILLIPS: Thank you.
- 22 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And before you joined

- 1 the call, we had just approved -- moved to approve the
- 2 agenda.
- MS. PHILLIPS: Okay.
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: So that's been done.
- 5 That's item 1 on the agenda.
- 6 MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah.
- 7 MS. SINGLETON: Frank?
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Uh-huh?
- 9 MS. SINGLETON: I was wondering if you could
- 10 ask of people -- this is Sarah.
- 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes?
- MS. SINGLETON: If you could ask people who
- 13 are not on the board, who is present?
- 14 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Certainly. Let's
- 15 do -- indicate for the record those who are on the call
- 16 who are not members of the board. Would you please
- identify yourselves and your organizations?
- 18 MS. PERLE: Linda Perle for the Center for
- 19 Law and Social Policy.
- 20 MR. SAUNDERS: Don Saunders from NLADA.
- MS. BARNETT: And here at LSC is Helaine
- 22 Barnett, Vic Fortuno, Charles Jeffress is on the call,

- 1 Tom Polgar, Barbara Moldauer, Treefa Aziz, and Patricia
- 2 Batie.
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. Welcome,
- 4 everybody. The next item on our agenda is to consider
- 5 and act on the Board of Directors' response to the
- 6 Inspector General's Semiannual Report to Congress for
- 7 the period of April 1, 2006 through September 30, 2006.
- 8 Has everybody received the Inspector
- 9 General's Semiannual Report? You should have received
- 10 a printed copy of that.
- 11 A PARTICIPANT: Yep, I have it.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. And have you
- 13 also received, via email, the draft reply prepared by
- 14 LSC management?
- 15 A PARTICIPANT: Yes.
- 16 A PARTICIPANT: Yes.
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Everybody has that,
- 18 okay. I'm looking down on my screen, so let me take a
- 19 look at that. We've had a couple of people submit
- 20 proposed changes and I would be glad to have them -- I
- 21 want to present one for consideration, if I may, in
- 22 the -- what we call the cover letter to the memo.

- 1 The preface, the last paragraph where it
- 2 says -- this is immediately before my signature on
- 3 behalf of the Board, where it says, "I am pleased," I
- 4 would suggest that we substitute "We are pleased to
- 5 transmit to Congress," et cetera, and the rest of it
- 6 would remain the same.
- 7 Any objection to that editorial change?
- 8 A PARTICIPANT: None.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: I always prefer to use
- 10 the word, we, whenever it's appropriate and this looks
- 11 like it's a place where it is appropriate.
- 12 A couple of other people, as I said, have
- 13 submitted via email -- I don't know whether everyone
- 14 got those in time to review them, but I know that Mike
- 15 McKay had a change. Would you like to discuss that,
- 16 Mike?
- 17 MR. McKAY: Yes, and I see when Lillian
- 18 forwarded hers that there were -- it might not have
- 19 gone through accurately, but the essential change
- 20 emphasizes a little bit more on that paragraph the
- 21 importance of our efforts to detect violations of
- 22 Congressional restrictions. And so my proposed

- 1 amendment would rewrite the second sentence and add a
- 2 third sentence.
- It would read, "One of LSC's important duties
- 4 is to ensure that they operate in the manner prescribed
- 5 by Congress." And the new sentence would read, "We
- 6 continue our efforts to detect violations of
- 7 Congressional restrictions and to promptly eliminate
- 8 these practices by encouraging the highest standards of
- 9 quality."
- 10 I just thought that we would emphasize, of
- 11 course, quality, of course, equal access to justice. I
- 12 thought we needed to emphasize, so that it receives the
- 13 same level of emphasis, the subject of compliance.
- 14 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. I can't
- 15 tell from your memo -- is this on -- I'm reading on a
- 16 new computer program here that presents this thing in
- 17 screen format, so I'm a little confused on what page
- 18 I'm on when I'm looking at this screen. This is
- 19 Microsoft Outlook 2003.
- 20 A PARTICIPANT: It's not on a page, though,
- 21 Frank.
- 22 A PARTICIPANT: It's the preface.

- 1 A PARTICIPANT: It's the preface.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Oh, it's still in the
- 3 preface?
- 4 A PARTICIPANT: Yes.
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: I'm sorry.
- 6 MR. McKAY: And I apologize, it's the second
- 7 paragraph of the preface --
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay.
- 9 MR. McKAY: -- starting with the second
- 10 sentence.
- 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right.
- 12 MOTION
- 13 A PARTICIPANT: If that is a motion to amend,
- 14 I'll be happy to second that.
- MR. McKAY: Then I so move, Mike McKay.
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Moved and
- 17 seconded that those editorial changes be made. That
- 18 is -- we'll call it the McKay Amendment. Any
- 19 discussion of that proposed amendment?
- 20 (No response.)
- 21 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hearing none, all those
- in favor of the McKay Amendment please signify by

- 1 saying aye.
- 2 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Aye. Those oppose,
- 4 nay.
- 5 (No response.)
- 6 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right, that
- 7 amendment is adopted. Now Lillian, I believe you had
- 8 an amendment?
- 9 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: I do. My amendment
- 10 is -- would go to page 13. It's rather minor, but it
- 11 matters, I think. The last paragraph, the first
- 12 sentence, I would substitute for "Most of them do not
- 13 have access" to "Too many of them do not have access."
- I realize that "too many" is rather vague,
- 15 but "most of them" overstates what we fact, in fact,
- 16 been able to document. And I think anybody -- if
- 17 anybody is not -- who's eligible is not served, that
- 18 would be one too many and we certainly have documented
- 19 too many, in that we've documented 50 percent.
- So I would move that we substitute "too many"
- 21 for "most."
- 22 MOTION

- 1 A PARTICIPANT: Second.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. You've
- 3 heard that motion has been seconded. Is there any
- 4 discussion on the motion?
- 5 (No response.)
- 6 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All those in favor,
- 7 please say aye.
- 8 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Aye. Those oppose,
- 10 nay.
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right, so
- 13 unanimously adopted. There are a couple of -- does
- 14 anyone else have any other suggestions?
- 15 MS. SINGLETON: I have a couple of questions.
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, ma'am?
- MS. SINGLETON: One -- this is Sarah. On
- 18 page 7, the first is a question that I think I know the
- 19 answer to, but I want to be sure I'm correct. In the
- 20 discussion under LSC Regulations, we don't -- is the
- 21 reason that we don't mention Oregon that it happened
- 22 after September 30th?

- 1 MR. POLGAR: Yes.
- 2 MS. SINGLETON: Okay. Thank you. Under the
- 3 next part, Striving for Operational Efficiency, the
- 4 third sentence in that strikes me as the kind of
- 5 sentence that is just going to draw fire and I would
- 6 omit it. "LSC is a frugal steward of the taxpayers'
- 7 money."
- 8 After all the press, I just think that is a
- 9 sitting duck sentence and doesn't really add anything
- 10 to the information we're giving to Congress.
- 11 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: If that's a motion,
- 12 Sarah, I second it. This is Lillian.
- 13 MS. SINGLETON: Thank -- I'll make it a
- 14 motion. I move that we omit the first sentence in that
- 15 paragraph.
- 16 MOTION
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. I take it
- 18 somebody is keeping a record of all these amendments?
- MR. POLGAR: Yes, we are.
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay, good. All right.
- 21 MR. McKAY: Mike McKay and I just want to say
- 22 I agree with that, both -- support of the change. I

- 1 want to make it clear, though, that I believe, and I
- 2 suspect everyone else believes the same way, that we
- 3 are indeed a frugal steward of the taxpayers' money.
- 4 We just didn't think it was necessary to put the
- 5 sentence in, in light of the -- as Sarah indicated,
- 6 that sentence is a sitting duck.
- 7 MS. SINGLETON: I think the facts speak for
- 8 themselves anyway, so -- you know, 96 percent of the
- 9 money goes directly to the local funded programs.
- 10 MR. McKAY: And the other 4 percent is spent
- 11 frugally, in my opinion.
- MS. SINGLETON: Yeah.
- 13 A PARTICIPANT: I don't disagree with what
- 14 Mike says, I just think the sentence sticks out.
- 15 A PARTICIPANT: I agree.
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Good point. All right.
- 17 That was moved and seconded. Any further discussion
- 18 on that change?
- 19 (No response.)
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All those in favor,
- 21 please say aye.
- (Chorus of ayes.)

- 1 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Aye. Those oppose,
- 2 nay.
- 3 (No response.)
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Adopted unanimously.
- 5 A PARTICIPANT: I have one more question
- 6 about this. I thought perhaps we should say more about
- 7 the financial investigation other than just the small
- 8 reference that we have here.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Do you have a --
- 10 MS. SINGLETON: I really don't
- 11 have -- written to suggest that we do. I just thought
- 12 it might be better if we had our own discussion of what
- 13 went on that started a little bit before our
- 14 implementation where -- you know, how the Inspector
- 15 General's investigating a number of things.
- We, both Board and Management, complied fully
- 17 with his request and cooperated in his investigation.
- 18 He -- after however long it took, he came back with 11
- 19 recommendations and then go into -- we've already
- 20 implemented.
- 21 MR. JEFFRESS: Sarah, this is Charles
- 22 Jeffress. One of the reasons why there was less

- 1 attention on this management response was because the
- 2 Inspector General's report, of course, has a
- 3 significant -- a number of pages, significant
- 4 inspection on this. And the two reports are going to
- 5 be combined together, so we were not designed to redo
- or repeat the history or the facts of what had occurred
- 7 in that report, since the Inspector General gives it
- 8 significant attention in his version.
- 9 MS. SINGLETON: Well, he does.
- 10 A PARTICIPANT: They're good habits --
- 11 MR. JEFFRESS: It wouldn't hurt to repeat it,
- 12 but I --
- 13 MS. SINGLETON: Well, I thought we took out
- 14 some of the salient points that were good for us that
- 15 we could throw in before we say we're implementing his
- 16 recommendations. But I don't feel strongly; it just
- 17 seemed like we got to it rather quickly.
- 18 MR. GARTEN: Herb Garten here. We have, of
- 19 course, advised Congress in writing at the hearing of
- 20 many of these things and we've also had that press
- 21 release with the questions and the answers. And I
- 22 think to highlight it again is a mistake. I think the

- way we handled it is appropriate.
- 2 MOTION
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Any further
- 4 discussion on that or is there a motion?
- 5 (No response.)
- 6 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. In the -- let's
- 7 see, on page 6, where there's a discussion about the
- 8 CRLA investigation, at the beginning of that -- let's
- 9 see, the report -- I'm sorry, in the subparagraph, it's
- 10 called "Investigating California Rural Legal
- 11 Assistance," which is a subject heading at the top of
- 12 page 6.
- 13 About four lines down where it says "The
- 14 report alleged," I would suggest that we say "The
- 15 report stated, " rather than "alleged." I think it's
- 16 the position of the Inspector General that he has moved
- 17 beyond allegations to findings so that we probably just
- 18 want to say "The report stated," rather than "alleged."
- 19 Is there any objection to that editorial
- 20 change?
- 21 MR. GARTEN: Frank, Herb Garten. Is that a
- 22 correct statement where -- was there -- did he indicate

- 1 there was an additional investigation on some of those
- 2 or he was leaning to it? I don't have it in front of
- 3 me.
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: It's my understanding
- 5 that in discussions with the Inspector General, that he
- 6 takes the position that his report, once issued,
- 7 constitutes findings as opposed to mere allegations.
- 8 MR. GARTEN: But are they oral or is it some
- 9 of them are --
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: No, no. I think
- 11 this -- the report, in its entirety, is -- constitutes
- 12 findings as opposed to allegations. At
- 13 least -- someone on the staff, the management staff,
- 14 perhaps could elaborate on that, but that's --
- MR. JEFFRESS: I think -- this is Charles
- 16 Jeffress again. I think the four points that are made
- 17 in that sentence are findings and I think Mr. Garten's
- 18 correct that --
- 19 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right.
- 20 MR. JEFFRESS: -- there were a lot of other
- 21 things in his report that didn't reach the level of
- 22 findings, that I wouldn't suggest were findings. But

- 1 these four clearly were findings.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay.
- 3 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: I would -- I don't
- 4 mind taking out the "alleged." This is Lillian BeVier
- 5 talking. But I would -- and I'm perfectly happy to say
- 6 that these were the OIG's findings. My understanding
- 7 is that he has made those as findings, but that they
- 8 are still contested matters of fact, I mean, that CRLA
- 9 is --
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Contested by CRLA,
- 11 yeah.
- 12 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: By CRLA and I don't
- 13 want to be pushing back from the investigation at all,
- 14 but I think to report them as findings has a
- 15 connotation to me of -- as a conclusion that is
- 16 binding, as opposed to -- I mean, it's like a jury
- 17 finding of fact as opposed to -- you know, his
- 18 findings.
- 19 So I wouldn't mind saying that the -- he
- 20 reported his findings that the California -- that the
- 21 Inspector General reported his findings that -- that
- 22 seems to me to be accurate and to take the "alleged"

- 1 out of it and to be responsive to the IG's issue.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. All right.
- 3 That's fine with me. Would you -- I didn't note that.
- 4 Would you repeat your suggested wording?
- 5 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: Well, the suggested
- 6 wording would be "The Inspector General reported his
- 7 findings that" --
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. I'm satisfied
- 9 with that. Is there any objection to that editorial
- 10 change?
- 11 A PARTICIPANT: I second the motion.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. We'll
- 13 call -- make that a motion. Any further discussion on
- 14 that motion?
- 15 (No response.)
- 16 MOTION
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All those in favor,
- 18 please say aye.
- 19 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Opposed, nay.
- 21 (No response.)
- 22 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: The ayes have it. Then

- 1 in the second paragraph, where it says "Following
- 2 established procedures," there is an indication here
- 3 that our Office of Compliance and Enforcement has begun
- 4 its own investigation.
- 5 Perhaps we might do better to say something
- 6 like this: "Following established procedures, LSC's
- 7 Office of Compliance and Enforcement promptly requested
- 8 the evidence that was the basis for the OIG's report.
- 9 OCE has also asked the OIG and CRLA for additional
- 10 information."
- 11 A PARTICIPANT: Is that a motion?
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: I would make that as a
- 13 motion to change that entire paragraph to read as I
- 14 just stated.
- 15 MOTION
- A PARTICIPANT: Would you mind stating it
- 17 again, Frank?
- 18 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. Strike this
- 19 paragraph in its entirety and substitute the following:
- 20 "Following established procedures, LSC's Office of
- 21 Compliance and Enforcement promptly requested the
- 22 evidence that was the basis for the OIG's report. OCE

- 1 has also asked the OIG and CRLA for additional
- 2 information."
- 3 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: I'll second that
- 4 motion.
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And actually, we should
- 6 probably -- we're calling it OCE here. We probably
- 7 ought to -- after the words, Office of Compliance and
- 8 Enforcement, we probably ought to put in parentheses --
- 9 A PARTICIPANT: OCE.
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: -- OCE, closed
- 11 parentheses. So that --
- MR. POLGAR: Frank, that's been done earlier
- in the document.
- 14 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Has it?
- MR. POLGAR: Yes.
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay, I see it. You're
- 17 right. Never mind, strike my parenthetical. All
- 18 right. Is there a second to that -- you seconded it,
- 19 didn't you? I made the motion and you seconded it,
- 20 Lillian?
- 21 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: Yes, I seconded it.
- 22 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Any further discussion

- 1 on that?
- MR. McKAY: Well, Frank, I -- this is Mike
- 3 McKay.
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, sir?
- 5 MR. McKAY: I have a question. Why did you
- 6 want to reduce the power of our response? It seems to
- 7 me I kind of like the original language because it
- 8 suggests that we're taking this very -- we're looking
- 9 into it as well, not just the underlying allegations,
- 10 we've asked for the evidence, but I'm assuming we're
- 11 also looking at why we ourselves didn't find this.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Well, I understand that
- 13 and I can live with the language as it is, but
- 14 the -- it suggests that everybody is in the
- 15 investigation business here. In other words, the OIG
- 16 has completed its -- or at least, in part, an
- 17 investigation and now, OCE is doing its own
- 18 investigation of the investigation.
- 19 Whereas, it may more accurately -- and as I
- 20 said, I can live with the language as is, if we -- if
- 21 the board is of a mind to leave it just that way.
- 22 MR. McKAY: Well, I mean, I have no problem.

- 1 I guess -- you know, I'm willing to go with the
- 2 collective wisdom of the board. I just like the idea
- 3 of us not necessarily -- obviously, we're not going to
- 4 do what the OIG's already done, but there might be
- 5 other things we want to look at, including why we
- 6 ourselves didn't catch this, which I think -- it is an
- 7 important part of the investigation.
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. I would
- 9 certainly yield to the collective wisdom of the board
- 10 as well. And if there's --
- 11 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: But I don't
- 12 think -- this is Lillian. I'm not sure that the
- 13 sentence, as written, Mike, it's responsive to what
- 14 you're wanting it to say. It seems to me that what
- 15 you're wanting is that the board is encouraging
- 16 or -- you know, actively pursuing inquiry into this
- 17 issue.
- 18 And I don't know -- I'm don't -- I'm not sure
- 19 I want to call attention to the fact that the -- I
- 20 mean, that we didn't find it, that OCE didn't find it.
- 21 Although I think that's terribly important as an issue
- that we should be considering, but I don't know how to

- 1 say it in such a way that is --
- MR. GARTEN: Herb here. As the language is
- 3 urgently joined -- is factual as to what's happening?
- 4 Is that correct, staffwise?
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Well, let's just see
- 6 what management has to say about that. Any comments
- 7 from you folks?
- 8 MS. BARNETT: Well, that's the way we drafted
- 9 it. (Laughter.) I think what Frank was referring to
- 10 was a question that the OIG raised with regard to that
- 11 sentence, but that's the way we drafted it. And we
- 12 thought, at the time, that it was accurate.
- 13 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: Do you still think
- 14 that it's accurate?
- 15 MS. BARNETT: I think we still think it's
- 16 accurate. I think what the chairman was referring to
- 17 was a comment from the IG, you know, saying it could be
- 18 clearer to rewrite it. But the way we wrote it
- 19 originally is how we thought it was accurate and I
- 20 think we still think it's accurate.
- 21 MR. GARTEN: Herb here again. Considering
- 22 that, I think to start playing around with the

- 1 response, it just opens up Pandora's Box here.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. I withdraw
- 3 that motion and we'll leave it as it's written.
- 4 A PARTICIPANT: Frank, I do think you need to
- 5 change the word, allegations, since you took out
- 6 "alleged" up above. And I think substituting the OIG's
- 7 report for allegations -- even better.
- 8 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: I second that motion.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, I see your point.
- 10 So that we would strike the word, allegations.
- MS. BARNETT: And said the OIG report --
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: The OIG's report --
- 13 A PARTICIPANT: Yes.
- 14 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Let's take
- 15 that as a motion and you seconded it, Lillian. Any
- 16 further discussion on that motion?
- 17 (No response.)
- 18 MOTION
- 19 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All those in favor,
- 20 please say aye.
- 21 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 22 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Opposed, nay?

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: It's unanimously
- 3 adopted and that paragraph stays as it is written
- 4 except for that amendment. Now does that complete the
- 5 action on the management's response?
- 6 MR. McKAY: One more minor change on it
- 7 proposed on page 6 -- this is Mike McKay -- in the
- 8 footnote --
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, sir?
- 10 MR. McKAY: -- sentence -- this is
- 11 referencing the 25 findings that came over to
- 12 management apparently after September 30th. I would
- 13 propose if the last sentence or the -- excuse me, the
- 14 second to last sentence, they were referred on October
- 15 16th, 2006 after the reporting period ended.
- I would propose that that last clause be
- 17 deleted. I don't think it's important to invite the
- 18 Congress' attention that it was after the period. Just
- 19 say we got it on the 16th and we're working on it
- 20 without making it look -- it could be viewed by some
- 21 that it's a little shot at the IG.
- I don't think -- I'm sure that wasn't

- 1 intended, but I don't want it to be interpreted by
- 2 anybody on the Hill or, frankly, in the OIG's office,
- 3 so --
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: So you would put a
- 5 period after 2006 and strike the rest of the material?
- 6 MR. McKAY: Correct, I so move.
- 7 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: Second, Lillian
- 8 BeVier.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Any discussion on that?
- 10 MS. SINGLETON: I'm just not sure I
- 11 understand it. Are you taking -- this is Sarah. Are
- 12 you taking out the last sentence also, Mike?
- MR. McKAY: No.
- MS. SINGLETON: Okay, just --
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Oh, I misunderstood.
- 16 You're just striking the words, "after the reporting
- 17 period ended?"
- MR. McKAY: Yes.
- 19 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And putting a period
- 20 after 2006 and the rest of the footnote would remain
- 21 the same?
- MR. McKAY: Correct.

- 1 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Now that
- 2 that's been clarified, any further discussion on the
- 3 motion?
- 4 (No response.)
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All those in favor,
- 6 please say aye.
- 7 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Opposed, nay?
- 9 (No response.)
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: The ayes have it. That
- 11 amendment is made. Now, is there any other amendment
- to be made to management's response?
- MR. McKAY: Just a question. This is Mike
- 14 McKay again. On page 12 of the IG's report, the first
- 15 bulletpoint is referencing -- the statement about
- 16 first-class travel, "We did not find widespread
- 17 first-class travel and found only one instance of
- 18 questionable first-class travel."
- 19 I'm a firm believer in choosing battles and
- 20 I'm confident that management ignored that. I think
- 21 they ignored that for a reason. I felt a little
- 22 uncomfortable because I think I'm familiar with all

- 1 the -- question first-class travel and feel comfortable
- 2 with all of it.
- I'm wondering why we wouldn't put a footnote
- 4 in reasserting our position that it's not questionable.
- 5 Or is this really a battle that we should avoid?
- 6 MR. POLGAR: Well, Mike, this is Tom Polgar.
- 7 We can't amend the IG's report, so if we were going to
- 8 respond to that, we would have to do it in the body of
- 9 the board's response.
- 10 MR. McKAY: Indeed, that's what I meant. I
- 11 don't mean to suggest we're going to change his report.
- 12 But I'm talking about us responding in one -- maybe
- one of our footnotes or -- I don't want to make a big
- 14 deal out of it, but I feel uncomfortable having him say
- that there's one instance of questionable first-class
- 16 travel when I think we all believe that there wasn't
- 17 anything questionable. Again, I'm willing to defer to
- 18 the wisdom of --
- 19 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Well, if there's -- if
- 20 that's a reference -- do we take that to be a reference
- 21 to the Ireland travel or something else?
- MR. McKAY: You all know it? Does management

- 1 know which one that is?
- MR. POLGAR: Yes, it is a reference -- we
- 3 think it is a reference to Helaine's Ireland trip.
- 4 A PARTICIPANT: Which you're still
- 5 investigating, is that correct?
- 6 MR. POLGAR: That's correct.
- 7 A PARTICIPANT: Well, if he's still
- 8 investigating it, maybe we should just leave it there
- 9 and wait till that gets clarified.
- 10 A PARTICIPANT: That's great. And frankly, I
- 11 wasn't aware you were still investigating it. I guess
- 12 I'd propose that we make it clear somewhere, and maybe
- in just a footnote -- I don't want to make a big deal
- 14 out of it, but that we will address the first-class
- 15 travel issue once the IG makes a final report and makes
- 16 his final decision.
- 17 A PARTICIPANT: I got a letter from Skadden
- 18 with a bunch of numbers attached --
- 19 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: I wonder if we are just
- 20 as well off by not commenting on that at this point?
- 21 A PARTICIPANT: Frankly, after I heard the
- 22 fact that it's still being investigated, I agree with

- 1 that. I think we ought to just not say anything unless
- 2 someone strongly disagrees, recognizing I'm the one
- 3 that --
- 4 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: I would suggest to
- 5 management, however, that that issue -- this is Lillian
- 6 again -- that we flag it so that we make certain that
- 7 it -- you know, that whatever implication -- that when
- 8 it's over, it will be over and we can get it clarified
- 9 and be -- make clear what the resolution was.
- 10 And assuming, as I believe will be the case,
- 11 that it -- they may have questioned it, but that it
- 12 will be found not to be troublesome or problematic.
- 13 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Management, have you
- 14 flagged it?
- MS. BARNETT: I have taken a note of that.
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. We do need
- 17 for that to come to conclusion. It seems to me that
- 18 that's gone on entirely too long and that's not
- 19 necessarily a shot at anybody in particular, just on
- 20 the general subject of bringing that particular item to
- 21 an end. Any other discussion of this document?
- MR. GARTEN: Herb here, Herb Garten.

- 1 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, sir.
- MR. GARTEN: I was wondering whether there
- 3 should be any response to the statements the OIG is
- 4 making regarding the space situation and the rental.
- 5 And I -- was it the same reason, no mention made of it
- 6 because it's still ongoing?
- 7 MR. JEFFRESS: Herb, this is Charles
- 8 Jeffress. The tables in the IG's report, table 2 in
- 9 particular, there is a footnote to that. We worked
- 10 hard with the IG to try to put our respective
- 11 positions -- make them clear in that footnote.
- 12 And we did agree that that language that's
- 13 there now is something that we both believe makes our,
- 14 management's, and OIG's positions clear. Even though
- 15 we disagree, that's a statement of how we disagree and
- 16 I don't think we're going to get into any further
- 17 agreement, actually, until we resolve some other
- 18 issues. So I suspect this is as good as we're going to
- 19 get for right now.
- MR. GARTEN: You know, the thing is that it's
- 21 highlighted with big figures.
- MR. JEFFRESS: Right.

- 1 MR. GARTEN: And that may attract attention
- 2 and maybe some reference should be made, "As noted in
- 3 his footnote, this matter is still under discussion."
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Where would we put
- 5 that, Herb, if we inserted that?
- 6 MR. GARTEN: I've got a problem. I'm at
- 7 11,000 feet at a public phone and I didn't bring it up
- 8 with me. I just felt that -- just as McKay indicated
- 9 that no mention was made, perhaps here is the reason
- 10 for not making any reference to it. But it does stand
- 11 out, it's a big figure.
- 12 VICE CHAIRMAN BeVIER: This is Lillian. As I
- 13 recall the history of this, we have asked the OIG and
- 14 management to work out the issue in this footnote. My
- 15 understanding from Charles of what's happened is that
- 16 there -- they negotiated over this language and this
- 17 language is a true representation of an ongoing
- 18 dispute, so that management's position, as I understand
- 19 what Charles said -- Charles, correct me if this is
- 20 wrong, but management's position has been fairly
- 21 represented in this footnote.
- 22 So the number is still there, but the

- 1 footnote explains that this is a matter about which
- 2 management and the OIG disagree. I don't see any
- 3 purpose to be served in calling further attention to
- 4 it, because that disagreement is not going to go away.
- 5 This footnote makes clear that that disagreement
- 6 persists and that we're trying to still get what the
- 7 facts are.
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: I would agree with your
- 9 analysis of that, Lillian, and I think since we now are
- 10 better informed that this footnote is, in fact, a
- 11 negotiated footnote that we -- we would only be one
- 12 side of the discussion here and we probably better just
- 13 leave it as it is.
- 14 A PARTICIPANT: That's satisfactory to me.
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Without further
- 16 highlighting --
- 17 A PARTICIPANT: Okay.
- 18 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. If there's
- 19 no further discussion, then, on this particular
- 20 document, which is the -- in effect, management's
- 21 response to the IG's SAR, although it's labeled on its
- 22 face, "Semiannual Reports," plural, to the Congress,

- 1 we're simply forwarding the IG's report as it is.
- 2 And then this is our -- this is management's
- 3 portion of it. So as amended, I would entertain a
- 4 motion to approve management's portion of the
- 5 Semiannual Report as it has been amended.
- 6 MOTION
- 7 A PARTICIPANT: So moved.
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Is there a second?
- 9 MR. GARTEN: Second, Herb Garten.
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Any further
- 11 discussion, then, on management's Semiannual Report?
- 12 (No response.)
- 13 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hearing none, all those
- 14 in favor, please say aye.
- 15 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Those opposed, nay.
- 17 (No response.)
- 18 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And the report, as
- 19 amended, is adopted. Now I believe the agenda
- 20 provides -- let me make sure I've got the agenda in
- 21 front of me here. But is there any other business to
- 22 come before the meeting?

- 1 MR. MEITES: Frank, this is Tom. I just have
- 2 a question.
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, sir.
- 4 MR. MEITES: I want to make sure that I'm
- 5 going to be in Washington the right date. My calendar
- 6 says our Washington meeting begins on Friday, January
- 7 19th. Is that correct?
- 8 MS. BARNETT: That is correct.
- 9 MR. MEITES: Okay, that's all I needed to
- 10 know. Thank you.
- 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Tom Polgar, do you have
- 12 a briefing for us on the budget?
- MR. POLGAR: It's a briefing that -- yes,
- 14 it's a briefing that will take less than a minute. It
- 15 currently appears that the Senate has given up the gust
- in terms of trying to pass the remaining outstanding
- 17 appropriations bills. And the expectation now is that
- 18 Congress is going to do a continuing resolution next
- 19 week that will extend through sometime in late February
- 20 or March and go home.
- 21 So it looks like we're going to be funded at
- the '06 levels until February, March of next year when

- 1 the Congress starts -- when the new Congress starts
- 2 moving their regular '07 appropriations bills.
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Did that
- 4 complete your briefing?
- 5 MR. POLGAR: Yes.
- 6 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And of course, it
- 7 requires no action since it's a briefing. So I take it
- 8 that under the item called "Consider and act on other
- 9 business," that there is no other business.
- 10 MR. FUENTES: Tom Fuentes.
- 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, sir.
- MR. FUENTES: Before we adjourn, I would just
- 13 like to join with all of our colleagues in saluting and
- 14 congratulating our colleague, Herb Garten, on his
- 15 recent recognition for his pro bono accomplishments and
- 16 leadership and say that we're all very proud of Herb.
- 17 A PARTICIPANT: Here, here.
- 18 A PARTICIPANT: I agree.
- 19 A PARTICIPANT: No doubt.
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Absolutely. We're all
- 21 impressed, Herb, and we look forward to some
- 22 hospitality in Baltimore sometime in the future.

- 1 MR. GARTEN: I hope so. Thank you all for
- 2 your continuing support. It's been a real pleasure to
- 3 work with you these past years.
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Now is there any public
- 5 comment?
- 6 (No response.)
- 7 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hearing none, I would
- 8 entertain a motion to adjourn the meeting.
- 9 MOTION
- 10 A PARTICIPANT: So moved.
- 11 A PARTICIPANT: So moved.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right, moved and
- 13 seconded. Any objection to adjourning the meeting?
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: If not, I'll declare
- 16 the meeting adjourned.
- 17 (At 2:40 p.m., the meeting was adjourned.)

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
