	Effective July 1, 2011, the State of Wisconsin eliminated State appropriations funding for civil legal assistance. Legal Action of Wisconsin was receiving \$1,375,650 per year in State funding so the cut has triggered the loss of almost 20 advocates. In 2013, no additional reserves will be available and we expect IOLTA funding to decrease to almost \$113,000. Prior to 2012, Legal Action was receiving substantial funding from HUD HPRP stimulus funding most of which ended in the third quarter of 2011. Between 2011 and 2012, HPRP funding decreased by \$401,294. Staffing has gone from a peak of 112 FTE's in April 2011 to a projected level of 88 FTE's in July 2012. A loss of 24 positions. Since we wil be unable to continue to use reserves to support services in 2013, we expect to lose another 18 to 22 FTE ovre the next 12 months. the total loss from 2011 through 2013 is expected to be in the range of 42 to 46 FTE's, a 38% to 41% loss from April 2011.
Wisconsin Judicare, Inc.	We have been fiscally prudent and do not anticipate a budget deficit. While we have not made any staffing changes from 2011 to 2012, there remains two unfilled positions. Anticipate more brief service.
