3	CHAIRMAN McKAY: Since we're starting a little
4	late, I thought we'd get moving as soon as we could so that
5	we could finish on time for the next important item on the
6	agenda, which is lunch.
7	So, I'll call the Finance Committee meeting to
8	order, and we'll address the first item on the agenda, which
9	is approval of the agenda.
10	MOTION
11	A PARTICIPANT: So moved.
12	CHAIRMAN McKAY: Second?
13	A PARTICIPANT: Second.
14	CHAIRMAN McKAY: All those in favor?
15	(Chorus of ayes.)
16	CHAIRMAN McKAY: Opposed?
17	(No response.)
18	CHAIRMAN McKAY: The agenda is approved.
19	MOTION
20	CHAIRMAN McKAY: The second item is approval of the
21	minutes of the October 28, 2005, meeting.

- 1 Any comments or corrections?
- 2 A PARTICIPANT: Move to approve.
- 3 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Second?
- 4 A PARTICIPANT: Second.
- 5 CHAIRMAN McKAY: All those in favor?
- 6 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 7 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Opposed?
- 8 (No response.)
- 9 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Minutes are approved.
- 10 Next item on the agenda requires the presence of
- 11 our IG, Mr. West, and he's not here. With the approval of
- 12 the committee, we'll move on to number 4, and when -- Kirt
- 13 West -- and Mr. Polgar, we'll need, as well.
- 14 Thank you.
- 15 (Pause.)
- 16 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Kirt, the item on the agenda is
- 17 the financial audit.
- 18 Could you address the committee on the financial
- 19 audit for fiscal year 2005?
- 20 MR. WEST: The status is it has not yet been
- 21 issued.

- 1 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Identify for the record who you
- 2 are.
- MR. WEST: Kirt West, Inspector General.
- I can give you sort of a broad overview of it.
- 5 They're waiting on -- before they can issue the
- 6 draft report, they're waiting on one statement from a law
- 7 firm that's providing representation in one of our cases,
- 8 just to close it out, but it's basically a good news story.
- 9 It's going to be a --
- 10 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Can I stop you for a second?
- 11 Could you take a step back, since some of us are new on the
- 12 committee, and just briefly tell us what it is and who's
- 13 doing it?
- 14 MR. WEST: I'm sorry.
- 15 CHAIRMAN McKAY: You flatter us by thinking we
- 16 know.
- MR. WEST: What happens is, on an annual basis,
- 18 there is a financial statement done for the corporation, and
- 19 what has happened is the IG contracts with a independent
- 20 public accounting firm to come in and actually do the audit.
- 21 We oversee the audit, but the auditors come in from

- 1 the outside.
- They meet with the treasurer, and documents
- 3 are secured by them.
- 4 They look at the record.
- 5 They look at the support.
- Then they issue a draft audit opinion, and then
- 7 they comment on any kind of issues they might find, and so,
- 8 the -- we're using a firm called Oppenheim.
- 9 It's the -- we're in an option year in the
- 10 contract, and we'll probably go out next year and re-bid it,
- 11 just on the basis that, sort of in the Sarbanes-Oxley world,
- 12 the recommendation is you need to change auditors every so
- often, so there's not -- the familiarity can sometimes be an
- 14 obstacle to effective auditing.
- And so, they have come in. They've done the field
- 16 work.
- 17 They've talked to Dave Richardson.
- One of my staff, who is a financial auditor, has
- 19 worked with them.
- They've secured the information, and they've
- 21 reviewed all the corporation's financial records, support

- 1 for -- including things like inventory, record keeping. You
- 2 know, they look through checks. So, it's a pretty thorough
- 3 financial statement audit, and the draft opinion, as I've
- 4 been told, is going to be -- going to have some very minor
- 5 observations, but they first need this last letter from the
- 6 law firm, because they have to look at all potential
- 7 liabilities, and so, that -- you know, when you get the
- 8 financial statement, you'll see a lot of footnotes, and
- 9 they'll record, you know, liabilities, because if somebody
- 10 has a lawsuit against the corporation, they have to budget
- 11 for what that might potentially cost.
- 12 The change from previous years -- in previous
- 13 years, the Friends of Legal Services Corporation was listed
- 14 as a component of LSC.
- That is changing this year, they'll be listed as a
- 16 related party, and the reason for that change is because
- 17 Friends of Legal Services has taken certain steps to make
- 18 itself independent of LSC.
- 19 The steps included hiring a part-time staff person,
- 20 having their own separate space in the building, as well as a
- 21 contribution that they made during that fiscal year to an

- 1 outside organization in fulfillment of the Friends charter.
- 2 So, that's a change.
- They're going to issue a management letter, which
- 4 is, I would call or characterize as sort of housekeeping
- 5 issues, things like you need to have a little better
- 6 inventory system, increase your level of capitalization,
- 7 because you're getting into too fine of detail, and I've
- 8 talked to Charles about it. It's things like -- they're all
- 9 good improvements, but it's really a very minor thing.
- 10 It would be different if they had a reportable
- 11 condition, then we'd all in this room have something to be
- 12 concerned about, but it's not, so it's -- essentially, it's
- 13 going to be a good opinion. You know, the corporation's
- 14 records are sound, and they need to make a couple little
- 15 adjustments in terms of how things are -- you know, tracking
- 16 inventory and things like that.
- 17 CHAIRMAN McKAY: When do you expect a written
- 18 document to be produced?
- 19 MR. WEST: The draft will be issued as soon as they
- 20 receive this letter from the law firm and clear out that last
- 21 thing. When I put this on the agenda, I was hopeful we'd

- 1 have a draft report by now, but we -- so, I would hope early
- 2 February, and then it's given to the corporation, and they
- 3 respond to the draft report, and the final report will be
- 4 issued.
- 5 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Do you expect we'll have a final
- 6 report before our next board meeting?
- 7 MR. WEST: Yes, I do.
- 8 CHAIRMAN McKAY: And that will be an item we'll
- 9 discuss, we'll have on our agenda at the next board meeting?
- 10 MR. WEST: Yes. And I will see that everybody on
- 11 the finance committee receives the report in its totality, so
- 12 you have a chance to look at it, and I will also provide you
- 13 the information, you know, the contact in my office, as well
- 14 as -- obviously, you can talk to Dave Richardson if you have
- 15 particular questions about -- and probably Dave is the one to
- 16 talk to first in terms of, you know, a particular line in the
- 17 audit, you know, what the report -- what it means.
- 18 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Okay.
- 19 Great.
- Thank you.
- 21 Any questions for Mr. West?

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Thank you.
- Next item on the agenda is the final fiscal year
- 4 2006 appropriations. I think we're going to hear from Mr.
- 5 Polgar.
- 6 MR. POLGAR: Good morning, everyone. For the
- 7 record, my name is Tom Polgar, and I'm director of government
- 8 relations and public affairs.
- 9 There is a table on page 13 of the board book which
- 10 compares the '05 budget and the final '06 budget. In short,
- 11 we started -- in '05, we had 330.8 million total.
- 12 Although the House passed the -- basically a flat
- 13 budget and the Senate proposed a \$34 million increase to
- 14 raise us to 358 million -- excuse me -- a \$28 million
- increase -- in conference, the House receded to the Senate,
- 16 and then the -- excuse me -- the Senate receded to the House,
- 17 and then, on top of that, they imposed a quarter-of-a-percent
- 18 across-the-board cut on the entire bill in every account.
- 19 So, we came out of the conference with a minor
- 20 reduction.
- Then, about a month-and-a-half later, when they

- 1 were finishing up the defense appropriations bill, they put
- 2 in a 1-percent across-the-board cut on virtually all
- 3 government accounts, partly to pay for a \$17 billion Katrina
- 4 supplemental, and so, we ended up with -- 1.28 percent below
- 5 the FY '05 levels. So, basically, the total LSC budget and
- 6 all the components thereof, the basic field line, the census
- 7 adjustment line, TIG, and so forth, are all at the '05 level,
- 8 minus 1.28 percent, and all those totals are on the chart,
- 9 and I'll be happy to take any questions.
- 10 CHAIRMAN McKAY: So, to summarize, it looked like
- 11 we were going to get the same appropriation as we received
- 12 last year, well below what we requested, and then, because
- of -- go ahead.
- 14 Was that incorrect?
- MR. POLGAR: No, no.
- 16 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Great. And then, because of
- 17 certain negotiations relating to budgetary pressures, we
- 18 received a 1.28-percent reduction.
- 19 MR. POLGAR: That's essentially correct, yes.
- 20 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Any questions from the committee,
- 21 or anyone here, for Mr. Polgar?

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Thanks a lot.
- Next item on the agenda is considering and acting
- 4 on the adoption of a consolidated operating budget for fiscal
- 5 year 2006, and we're going to hear from Mr. Jeffress and Mr.
- 6 Richardson.
- 7 MR. JEFFRESS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, members of
- 8 the board.
- 9 The consolidated operating budget, as you know, we
- 10 have to adopt every year --
- 11 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Could you, for the record, tell us
- 12 who you are?
- 13 MR. JEFFRESS: I'm sorry. Thank you. Charles
- 14 Jeffress, chief administrative officer for Legal Services
- 15 Corporation, and assisting me is the treasurer of the
- 16 corporation, David Richardson.
- 17 Congress, as Tom just reported, passed the final
- 18 appropriations bill. So, there are some modifications
- 19 necessary in the temporary operating budget which the board
- 20 adopted in July and then modified in October.
- So, what's coming to you today is, in fact, our

- 1 final -- what we call consolidated operating budget -- for
- 2 fiscal year 2006.
- The memo describing what's in the budget starts on
- 4 page 14 in your board book, if you are looking for it.
- In October, we told you that we would take the most
- 6 conservative of the possible outcomes from Congress in
- 7 preparing a temporary operating budget, which we did, and
- 8 while we didn't get what we had hoped to get from Congress,
- 9 it wasn't as bad as the most conservative option which we had
- 10 put in our temporary operating budget.
- So, the final appropriations passed by Congress is
- 12 actually a little more money for the corporation than what we
- 13 had in our temporary operating budget.
- So, the consolidated operating budget being
- 15 presented to you has a little more money in it than what the
- 16 temporary operating budget was that you adopted in October.
- 17 Mr. Chairman, perhaps I should go over the
- 18 attachments of the charts to make sure folks understand how
- 19 these charts are prepared -- I realize there are some new
- 20 members on this committee -- for us to be able to read these
- 21 charts.

- 1 MS. PHILLIPS: Mr. Chairman, I have a question.
- Who is the treasurer? You?
- 3 MR. JEFFRESS: No, David Richardson is the
- 4 treasurer.
- 5 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay.
- 6 Do we hear from the treasurer or no, because in the
- 7 bylaws, I believe I read that, you know, the treasurer is
- 8 supposed to report to the board, or is that incorrect?
- 9 MR. JEFFRESS: Right. This includes the
- 10 treasurer's report.
- 11 The chief administrative officer was established
- 12 this past year, since the bylaws were written.
- So, the treasurer, in fact, prepares this report
- 14 and gives it to me, which I transmit to the board.
- So, it is, in fact, the report from the treasurer,
- 16 as transmitted through me.
- 17 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Any other questions before he goes
- 18 on?
- 19 MR. MEITES: I detect that you were going to go on
- 20 to page 16 of the board book, but I don't understand page 14.
- 21 MR. JEFFRESS: All right.

- 1 MR. MEITES: So, why don't you start with page 14?
- 2 CHAIRMAN McKAY: All right. We'll start with page
- 3 14.
- 4 Page 14 is the memo to the president outlining
- 5 what's in the budget.
- 6 Would you like me to talk about these columns here
- 7 on page 14?
- 8 MR. MEITES: Yeah, the chart.
- 9 MR. JEFFRESS: The chart?
- MR. MEITES: Yes.
- MR. JEFFRESS: Our budget -- our appropriations
- 12 from Congress do not come in specific line items. We don't
- 13 get money for OLA and for OPP. We get it in broad
- 14 categories.
- So, the four broad categories there -- basic field
- 16 programs, technology initiatives, management and
- 17 administration, and Inspector General -- are the broad
- 18 categories.
- 19 There is a fifth category that -- this is the only
- 20 year that it's been here.
- It's because when the Senate was working on their

- 1 appropriations bill, they did not add up the money.
- 2 The money that was in the total in the bill did not
- 3 match the sum of the subsections.
- So, in preparing the temporary operating budget, we
- 5 had to show that \$400,000 as being a mystery and uncertain
- 6 exactly how Congress was going to resolve that.
- 7 So, that would hopefully not reappear, but we had
- 8 to do that this year because of the way the Senate budget was
- 9 written.
- 10 So, the first column, funding levels in the fiscal
- 11 year 2006 temporary operating budget, are what the board
- 12 adopted in October.
- The fiscal year 2006 appropriation is what Tom
- 14 Polgar just reported on. That is what we received from
- 15 Congress.
- The third column there, then, is just the
- 17 difference between what we anticipated in October and what
- 18 you all approved in October and what Congress actually
- 19 approved in the final appropriation.
- MR. MEITES: Okay.
- Thank you.

- 1 MS. PHILLIPS: The caption in the last column --
- 2 MR. JEFFRESS: Yes.
- MS. PHILLIPS: It's confusing, because -- is it
- 4 supposed to read just decrease or increase and decrease?
- 5 MR. JEFFRESS: Anything in parentheses is a
- 6 decrease, and things not in parentheses represent an
- 7 increase.
- 8 So, the only decrease, which was what Congress
- 9 approved ended up being less than the temporary operating
- 10 budget, was in the Inspector General line item.
- MS. PHILLIPS: So, Inspector General is a decrease.
- 12 MR. JEFFRESS: Right.
- Congress approved \$32,000 less than what we had
- 14 anticipated in the temporary operating budget.
- 15 CHAIRMAN McKAY: So, to summarize, the reason
- 16 we're -- the item on -- really, on the agenda here today is,
- in October, we agreed to the first column.
- 18 MR. JEFFRESS: Correct.
- 19 CHAIRMAN McKAY: The second column is what Congress
- 20 ultimately gave us.
- MR. JEFFRESS: Correct.

- 1 CHAIRMAN McKAY: The third column reflects that
- 2 we -- the difference, which is a little over \$2 million.
- 3 MR. JEFFRESS: The adjustments that we have to
- 4 make.
- 5 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Indeed. And so, the charge today
- is to approve a new budget which would incorporate that
- 7 additional \$2.2 million.
- 8 MR. JEFFRESS: That's correct.
- 9 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Thank you.
- 10 Any other questions?
- 11 MR. JEFFRESS: One response to Ms. Phillips. The
- 12 Inspector General's offset, of course, wouldn't have happened
- 13 except for the across-the-board decrease. It was not because
- 14 we had misread the line item or something. When they did the
- 15 across-the-board decrease, it affected the bottom there.
- 16 Other questions before 16?
- 17 (No response.)
- 18 MR. JEFFRESS: Just to give an overview, again,
- 19 especially for members who have not been on the committee and
- 20 reviewed this carefully before, on page 16, you have a chart
- 21 that shows our proposed budget for 2006.

- Our budget actually consists of three different
- 2 types of components.
- 3 Column one represents the appropriate from
- 4 Congress, and that is the same as you saw on page 14. That
- 5 is what Congress approved for us in October.
- 6 Column two represents monies unspent in last fiscal
- 7 year that we carry forward into this fiscal year.
- 8 So, there is unspent monies or carryover, if you
- 9 will, in each of the four basic legal assistance categories,
- in management and administration, the loan repayment program,
- 11 and in the Inspector General's account. There was carryover
- 12 in each of those accounts.
- 13 The third column represents other funds to the
- 14 corporation, in addition to congressional appropriations and
- 15 carryover.
- U.S. Court of Veterans Appeals funds, as this board
- 17 heard, I guess, a year ago, contracts with the corporation to
- 18 assist with appeals for veterans, and we, in turn, contract
- 19 with a consortium of pro bono attorneys for services.
- 20 Grants from other funds represents recoveries,
- 21 primarily where grantees have sold properties that LSC has an

- 1 interest in, and some of that -- proceeds from that sale come
- 2 back to LSC.
- In management and administration, you see a
- 4 \$250,000 item there.
- 5 That's an estimate of the interest that we will
- 6 earn this year from our account, from the time we draw down
- 7 funds to the time we actually spend funds. So, those three
- 8 columns combined result in the total operating budget
- 9 available to the corporation for fiscal year 2006.
- 10 So, while Congress authorized, appropriated 326.5
- 11 million by adding carryover and other funds, our budget
- 12 actually will be 332.7 million.
- MR. MEITES: Charles, how does that compare with
- 14 our total operating budget, final, for fiscal year 2005?
- MR. JEFFRESS: It is slightly less.
- David, do you have that number?
- I have it, and I will -- give me one second to get
- 18 it to you.
- 19 Our fiscal year 2005 annual budget -- I'm sorry.
- 20 That's management and administration. I would have to add
- 21 all these together. I'm sorry.

- So, the bottom of column four, 332.7 million, is
- 2 the money available to the corporation to budget for fiscal
- 3 year 2006.
- The next page, 17, shows you how the management is
- 5 recommending that that money be distributed across the
- 6 offices and across the line items for each office for fiscal
- 7 year 2006.
- I say "management recommends." Notice the final
- 9 column is the Inspector General's column. That, of course,
- 10 is provided by the Inspector General to us, is included in
- 11 this presentation to you. Management has not made any
- 12 changes in what has been submitted by the Inspector General,
- 13 but the -- each of the other offices and line items is
- 14 reflected there.
- I will say to you the change in this from what you
- 16 saw in October, the additional money that we received for
- 17 Congress, went to the -- for the management and
- 18 administration accounts, at least -- now, for basic field, of
- 19 course it went to basic field, but for the management and
- 20 administration accounts, the additional money appropriated to
- 21 Congress went for outside legal counsel.

- 1 The Office of Legal Affairs office line item here
- 2 under "consulting" has been significantly increased since
- 3 fiscal year 2005.
- 4 The directors' and officers' liability insurance
- 5 for the corporation, when we put it out this year to solicit
- 6 bids, the best we were able to do increased our deductible
- 7 from \$50,000 per case to \$150,000 per case.
- So, we had to provide in the budget for expected
- 9 additional expenses for legal defense.
- 10 CHAIRMAN McKAY: And as I understand it, that
- 11 means, every time we hire a law firm, instead of paying
- 12 \$50,000 before insurance kicks in, we now have to pay
- 13 \$150,000 before insurance kicks in. Is that correct?
- 14 MR. JEFFRESS: That's correct.
- Now, there are -- sometimes we hire outside firms
- 16 for things that are not covered by insurance, but for those
- 17 things covered by insurance, that's right. We now have to
- 18 pay 150,000 out of pocket before the insurance kicks in, on
- 19 each case.
- 20 MR. MEITES: Do our grantees know that when they
- 21 sue us it costs us 150,000 bucks every time we get sued?

- 1 MR. JEFFRESS: If they knew anything, they only
- 2 knew 50, but --
- 3 MR. MEITES: But from now on, every time they sue
- 4 us, it costs us \$150,000.
- 5 MR. JEFFRESS: At minimum.
- 6 MR. MEITES: Maybe they should call us up before
- 7 they sue us.
- 8 MS. BeVIER: I have something in the nature of a
- 9 completely trivial question, but it has to do with this item
- 10 for personnel compensation and --
- 11 MR. JEFFRESS: Yes.
- MS. BeVIER: -- the board of directors is zero, and
- 13 what I'm curious about is the per diem that we receive and
- 14 whether that doesn't count as compensation or -- or, I mean,
- 15 you know --
- MR. JEFFRESS: If we put it as compensation, you'd
- 17 be taxed on it, so we count it as --
- MS. BeVIER: We're not taxed on it anyway?
- MR. JEFFRESS: Not your travel expense
- 20 reimbursement.
- MS. BeVIER: No, not the travel expense but \$320 we

- 1 get, you know, for a day.
- MR. RICHARDSON: For a day. We consider you
- 3 consultants.
- 4 So, you get a consulting fee, attendance fee.
- 5 So, therefore, you get a 1099 for that.
- 6 MS. BeVIER: Right. Uncle Sam does consider it --
- 7 MR. JEFFRESS: I'm sorry. I misunderstood what you
- 8 were talking about.
- 9 I think of per diem as reimbursement for expenses,
- 10 but you're right.
- MS. BeVIER: So, that's the only reason it's not
- 12 under the board thing.
- I mean -- all right.
- MR. JEFFRESS: Well, it's under consultants, under
- 15 board consultants.
- MS. BeVIER: Yes.
- 17 All right.
- MR. JEFFRESS: So, if any of you want to put on
- 19 your resume that you're a consultant to LSC.
- MS. BeVIER: No, because then I'd have to pay the
- 21 business tax.

- 1 (Laughter.)
- 2 MR. JEFFRESS: Okay.
- 3 All right.
- So, this page 17, then, reflects how we recommend
- 5 that the money be distributed across the offices and line
- 6 items within the management and administration accounts.
- 7 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Could I impose on you or David to
- 8 briefly summarize the changes that you made that we would be
- 9 considering today, because I don't think they jump out at us.
- 10 MR. JEFFRESS: Right.
- 11 Let me ask David to.
- MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
- We talked about the increases and decreases that
- 14 come as a result of the appropriations. There were \$73,000
- increase from the temporary operating budget to the
- 16 consolidated operating budget for management and
- 17 administration which would affect page 17.
- In addition to that, we had included \$1.8 million
- 19 for carryover and an additional \$53,000 for contracts that
- 20 were outstanding.
- So, basically, we had included in carryover in the

- 1 temporary operating budget \$1,853,000. I had held aside,
- 2 because I knew that there was some bills coming in -- when we
- 3 did the temporary operating budget, I held aside about
- 4 \$15,000.
- 5 So, we paid seven -- so, there's an additional
- 6 \$7,000 that would add to the carryover.
- 7 So, this increase in management and administration
- 8 is basically \$82,000.
- 9 That money was put into the consulting line in
- 10 Legal Affairs to help underwrite some of the outside counsel
- 11 cost.
- In addition to that, there was a decision made
- during this October to now time period that there would only
- 14 be three issues of the magazine this year, and there would be
- 15 no annual report.
- So, we moved 35,000 from the printing in the
- 17 Government Affairs budget and also put that into the
- 18 consulting line and Legal Affairs.
- 19 Additionally, we had set aside \$159,000 in the
- 20 contingency line.
- We reduced that to 130, which is what the

- 1 contingency fund was for last year, and I moved that 29,000
- 2 also into the consulting line for litigation.
- 3 So, all the changes that are effective were that,
- 4 and all the decreases went into the consulting line for the
- 5 Legal Affairs outside counsel fund.
- 6 CHAIRMAN McKAY: So, to summarize, as I understand
- 7 it, wherever you were able to obtain a savings or take a
- 8 carryover, to the extent possible, those savings were then
- 9 placed in that line which is -- consulting, which is really a
- 10 word for outside counsel, which reads \$369,898.
- Is that correct?
- MR. RICHARDSON: That is correct.
- 13 CHAIRMAN McKAY: And that's really the budgetary
- 14 change that we're addressing today.
- 15 MR. RICHARDSON: Considering management and
- 16 administration, yes.
- 17 CHAIRMAN McKAY: In that category, that's right.
- MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.
- 19 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Okay.
- 20 MR. RICHARDSON: In addition to that, we have, of
- 21 course, made the adjustments in the basic field line that is

- 1 detailed in the memo on page 14. We have increased the basic
- 2 field \$1.8 million. We've increased the technology line, and
- 3 we've eliminated the 400,000 in this adding error that was
- 4 made in the appropriation process, and then the IG and his
- 5 office has reallocated the money within their budget to take
- 6 care of the 32,000 less in their funding.
- 7 MR. JEFFRESS: So, our recommendation to you would
- 8 be that the board adopt the resolution on page 17A that
- 9 authorizes this budget for the fiscal year for the
- 10 corporation.
- 11 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Ouestions or discussion?
- MS. PHILLIPS: The technology grant -- it's over \$1
- 13 million for 2006 and 2005. Can that money be used for
- 14 something else?
- 15 MR. JEFFRESS: No. Congress has authorized it
- 16 specifically for technology initiative grants, so it must be
- 17 used for that.
- 18 MR. RICHARDSON: And you will see -- we're going to
- 19 hand out in a few minutes the December report, and between
- 20 October and the end of December, we have contracted and
- 21 awarded \$1,013,000 of the technology grants and have awarded

- 1 those to the field.
- 2 MR. JEFFRESS: But in terms of the line items, we
- 3 actually can't transfer between any of these line items.
- 4 So, management and administration money could not
- 5 be put into basic field.
- TIG money could not be put into M&A or Inspector
- 7 General.
- We have to stay within the line items as
- 9 appropriated by Congress.
- 10 MS. PHILLIPS: Thank you.
- 11 MR. RICHARDSON: And if I could answer Tom's
- 12 question, last year's budget was \$338,500,000, and then, this
- 13 year, it's the 332,702,000, as we're proposing.
- 14 So, it's decreased \$5,700,000.
- 15 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Other questions or comments?
- 16 Let me just briefly follow up on a comment that Tom
- 17 made, and we are limited on time, but I just want to put out
- on the table an issue that we won't resolve today, but may be
- 19 something we as board members can think about, is this
- 20 growing number for -- that's being paid to outside counsel,
- 21 and I think -- I took the liberty of meeting with Vic

- 1 yesterday to discuss this issue, and it appears there is an
- 2 opportunity, it seems to me, for us, as board members, to
- 3 work with Vic to help address this issue.
- 4 One way -- Tom suggested it -- maybe we ought to be
- 5 telling the field, you know, how much this is costing us, and
- 6 see if there's a way to resolve some of these issues outside
- 7 of litigation, because of course, the field goes and obtains
- 8 pro bono counsel to sue us, but it seems to me that we can
- 9 begin to address in a different way the same issue, of
- 10 working -- assisting Vic in obtaining pro bono counsel to
- 11 assist us in the litigation.
- On first blush, it might not be as attractive or
- 13 sexy to represent LSC in litigation with the field. On the
- 14 other hand, most of this litigation relates to LSC's
- 15 forthright enforcement of congressional restrictions, and if
- 16 we continue to do what we're legally obligated to do, then I
- 17 personally believe, speaking for myself, that we're going to
- 18 be in a better standing with Congress to obtain additional
- 19 funding, which will help the field, and so, if we could make
- that presentation to private counsel and say, yeah, if you
- 21 help us do what we're doing by representing us for free,

- 1 we're laying the groundwork, hopefully, for additional
- 2 funding from Congress down the line.
- Vice has made that argument with law firms and has
- 4 received a favorable response, but it seems to me that
- 5 perhaps some of us, as members of the board, can participate
- 6 in that, because this line item is growing, paying outside
- 7 counsel, and if, for instance, we're sued in St. Louis and
- 8 we're trying to find a law firm to assist us in St. Louis,
- 9 perhaps a member of the board who lives nearby, like Chicago,
- 10 could fly down and participate in a presentation to a law
- 11 firm to explain why it is helpful, that you are helping
- 12 low-income people by representing Legal Services, because
- 13 that way, the money that we're spending, we'd otherwise be
- 14 spending for law firms, could be going to help the field.
- I know there are some budgetary issues there, but
- 16 the point is the net result is you're helping low-income
- 17 people who have legal needs when you represent Legal
- 18 Services.
- 19 So, I put this out as an issue.
- We don't have a lot of time, but I think it's
- 21 something that we as the Finance Committee can address and

- 1 make recommendations to the board on.
- 2 MR. MEITES: Do you need a motion on the budget?
- 3 CHAIRMAN McKAY: On the budget, yes.
- So, if there aren't any other questions or
- 5 concerns, then the issue -- the motion would relate to
- 6 recommending the resolution at page 17A to the full board for
- 7 approval.
- 8 MOTION
- 9 MS. PHILLIPS: So moved.
- 10 A PARTICIPANT: Second.
- 11 CHAIRMAN McKAY: All those in favor?
- 12 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 13 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Opposed?
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 CHAIRMAN McKAY: The motion passes.
- 16 Thank you.
- 17 The next item is item number 6, presentation of
- 18 financial reports for the first two months of fiscal year
- 19 2006, and we'll hear from Mr. Jeffress.
- MR. JEFFRESS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- David Richardson is passing out to you the

- 1 financial report for the first three months of the fiscal
- 2 year, which are October, November, and December. What we had
- 3 sent to you in advance was only October and November.
- 4 We closed out the books about three weeks after the
- 5 end of the month -- not closed them out, but three weeks
- 6 after the end of the month, we have that month's report
- 7 ready. So, this month's report just became ready.
- 8 In discussing with Chairman McKay yesterday how
- 9 best to present this information to the board, it felt
- 10 awkward presenting you old information when we had newer
- 11 information available.
- The newer information, of course, was not available
- 13 at the time we mailed you the board book. So, we sent you
- 14 the information that was available at the time, but we have
- 15 newer information, and we thought it best to present the
- 16 newer information.
- I will say to you, to those of you who looked at
- 18 the board book and have questions based on the old
- 19 information, the trends are all the same.
- The numbers have been changed somewhat, but there
- 21 is no significant change in any of the consequences or the

- 1 direction that we are going.
- But Mr. Chairman, with your permission, rather than
- 3 presenting the two-month budget report to the board, I
- 4 suggest that we go over the three-month budget report, if
- 5 that's agreeable to you.
- 6 CHAIRMAN McKAY: That's all right with the
- 7 committee.
- 8 MR. JEFFRESS: All right.
- 9 David just reminded me -- this budget report -- if
- 10 you turn to the second page, the first -- attachment A has
- 11 several columns.
- The first column reflects the annual budget for the
- 13 corporation.
- 14 We took the liberty, instead of comparing it to the
- 15 temporary operating budget, which was no longer the actual
- 16 budget, to compare it to the budget that you have just
- 17 recommended that the board adopt. So, in making these
- 18 comparisons of the spending to date, we are comparing it to
- 19 the recommended budget that you've just recommended to the
- 20 full board.
- So, I will stick with that page on attachment A for

- 1 a moment, and again, for those of you who are new to the
- 2 committee, go over the way it is presented to you.
- The first column is the annual budget for the year.
- 4 The second column represents the actual spending
- 5 fiscal year to date.
- 6 So, for the first three months of the fiscal
- 7 year -- October, November, December -- that represents the
- 8 actual spending in these categories, and on page 1 of
- 9 attachment A, we have the four categories for basic field,
- 10 Court of Veterans Appeals funds, grants from other funds, and
- 11 technology initiatives.
- 12 Column three, again, represents the annual budget.
- 13 If this had -- this represents what we would expect to have
- 14 spent for the first three months of the calendar year.
- Now, on this page, since all of these are things
- 16 that are grants to other folks, we just project that we're
- 17 going to spend these as soon as possible, so we show that
- 18 column three is the same as column 1.
- 19 When you get to the next page, which shows the
- 20 management and administration accounts, and the following,
- 21 Inspector General accounts, where we expect to spend roughly

- 1 1/12th of the money each month, that column three represents
- 2 a proportionate share of the annual budget, not the total
- 3 annual budget.
- 4 Column four shows the difference between what has
- 5 been spent to date and what the budget was, and column five
- 6 shows what that percentage of the variance is.
- 7 You can think of column four as unspent money were
- 8 we to spend the same proportion every month, and column five
- 9 being the percentage of unspent money.
- 10 Columns six and seven compare this year to previous
- 11 year for the same time period, and column eight shows
- 12 encumbrances to the extent that there is money that we're
- 13 obligated but we have not yet spent.
- 14 The second page of the attachment, which may make a
- 15 little more sense in some ways, more like the budget you're
- 16 used to seeing, has those same columns with respect to the
- 17 different offices within management and administration for
- 18 the corporation.
- 19 So, again, you see what has been budgeted for each
- 20 office, what actually was spent by each office for the first
- 21 three months, what one quarter of the year's budget, or three

- 1 months's budget, would be if it were proportional, and the
- 2 variance in terms of what three months' spending is versus
- 3 what was actually spent, percentage of the variance, the
- 4 comparison to past years, and the last column, the
- 5 encumbrances.
- I'm giving you the structure of this, and now I can
- 7 talk about what some significant numbers are to look at, if
- 8 you'd like.
- 9 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Please.
- 10 MR. JEFFRESS: The most significant number in terms
- 11 of the variance of our spending from what the proportionate
- 12 amount of spending would be, would be in compensation, and
- 13 that may be actually easier to see if you go over to
- 14 attachment B, which is two more pages over.
- For the management -- and this chart is just for
- 16 the management and administration account, and it shows you
- 17 that category, what we have spent in the first three months,
- 18 how that compares with a quarter of the year's budget, and
- 19 what the variance is between what a quarter of the budget is
- 20 and what was actually spent.
- 21 So, if you look at the column labeled "variance

- 1 budget versus actual," you will see where we are spending, in
- 2 every case, less than what was budgeted if we had spent a
- 3 quarter of the budget each -- thus far.
- 4 Compensation and benefits -- and I had highlighted
- 5 in the memo that was sent to you about the two-month -- it's
- 6 the same for three months. It's the single largest category
- 7 of unspent funds. That's a result of vacancies within the
- 8 corporation, where positions are vacant.
- 9 When those positions are vacant, obviously the
- 10 funds accumulate.
- So, the single biggest amount of unspent money is
- 12 where we budgeted for positions for the full year, and they
- 13 are currently vacant.
- 14 The second biggest category of unspent funds is in
- 15 consulting.
- The Thanksgiving to New Year's period of the year
- 17 is not a really active year for a lot of program visits, for
- 18 a lot of uses by consultants by the corporation.
- 19 This will pick up as we do more work in the rest of
- 20 the year.
- 21 And the next biggest -- and this will be the last

- 1 category I'll specifically mention -- is our capital
- 2 expenditures, and we capitalize as capital expenditures our
- 3 software and computer purchases, and we have not yet done
- 4 those for this year.
- 5 So, that's the reason why that category shows less
- 6 spending than what a quarter of the year might otherwise
- 7 account for.
- 8 So, those are -- this represents 19.8 percent for
- 9 the management and administration accounts of variance from
- 10 what it would be if we had spent a quarter of the year's
- 11 money so far.
- 12 It is relatively consistent with past years, the
- 13 first quarter being a relatively slow quarter, as a rule.
- 14 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Questions, comments?
- Tom.
- MR. FUENTES: Mr. Chairman, I appreciate the fine
- 17 report, and I appreciate the clarity of it. I am concerned,
- 18 though, just procedurally, and maybe this is more of a
- 19 long-term thing.
- These items or these reports, to me, are clearly
- 21 treasurer reports.

- I think the Finance Committee responsibility ought
- 2 be in using the corporate officer, the treasurer, for this,
- 3 and in the future, I would prefer maybe for you, Charles, as
- 4 an administrative chief, to give an overview, and then these
- 5 presentations of specific numbers be made by the treasurer.
- That would allow board members, especially Finance
- 7 Committee members, who have further questions and dealings in
- 8 the interim between board meetings, wants to get into
- 9 specifics, to go directly to the treasurer.
- I think we need to be decentralizing administration
- 11 and making resources available to the board, and I think that
- 12 would facilitate this.
- So, I would prefer this kind of -- what I see as a
- 14 treasurer's report -- being made to the committee by the
- 15 treasurer, and I think that's a bit of what Bernice was
- 16 getting at when she offered the earlier question.
- 17 MS. WATLINGTON: Hello?
- 18 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Yes, Ernestine.
- 19 (No response.)
- 20 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Any other comments or concerns?
- 21 MR. RICHARDSON: If I could just add to what

- 1 Charles was saying, if you would look on -- at, actually, the
- 2 page before management and administration, we have also
- 3 included a report on the loan repayment program.
- 4 We have a million dollars that is set aside for
- 5 that.
- We have made decisions as to which grantees will be
- 7 involved with this particular project, but we have not
- 8 selected those attorneys who will be involved with the loan
- 9 payments at this point.
- That's something that is ongoing, and hopefully
- 11 before the next committee meeting, some of those decisions
- 12 will be made and some of this money will be spent.
- In addition to that, I wanted to report to you on
- 14 the Inspector General.
- You'll see that his budget, the \$2.8 million for
- 16 the annual budget in column one and then his spending for the
- 17 three-month period, the 577,000 -- then, again, you've got
- 18 the three-month budget, the one quarter of his budget.
- So, at this point, he's \$130,000 under budget,
- 20 which is basically 18.5 percent under budget for the year.
- 21 His spending has increased, because the office is

- 1 ramped up, they have additional staff in, so that's a good
- 2 sign for the Inspector General.
- Also, the last page of this report shows you the
- 4 same breakdown that we did for management and administration.
- 5 You'll see that the compensation is the single
- 6 largest component of the \$130,000 variance, the amount that
- 7 was under-spent, and consulting, same reasoning, less people
- 8 were out in the field traveling at this point.
- 9 So, that's 52,700 there.
- 10 So, three quarters of the money is in those two
- 11 particular lines.
- 12 CHAIRMAN McKAY: I'm sorry. I don't know which
- 13 page you were referencing. You're talking about the
- 14 Inspector General.
- Okay.
- MR. RICHARDSON: Attachment C, yes.
- 17 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Thank you.
- 18 MR. MEITES: Mr. Chair?
- 19 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Yes.
- 20 MR. MEITES: I have a question about the loan
- 21 repayment program.

- 1 As I understand it, that \$1 billion is a one-year,
- 2 one-shot amount.
- 4 MR. RICHARDSON: It is money that was derived from
- 5 the Inspector General's carryover of 2004 that Congress
- 6 basically reprogrammed and allowed us to set up this loan
- 7 repayment program.
- 8 MR. MEITES: Is it the intention that the entire
- 9 million dollars will be disbursed this year?
- 10 MR. RICHARDSON: No, sir.
- 11 We plan on a three-year program. Basically, a
- 12 third of the money will be awarded, and then the subsequent
- 13 two years after that will be additional money.
- MR. MEITES: Thank you.
- 15 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Any other questions or comments?
- 16 (No response.)
- 17 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Thank you very much.
- 18 The next item is item number 7. We're going to
- 19 hear from Mr. Polgar on the 2007 budget request for Congress.
- 20 MR. POLGAR: I can make this one really brief.
- 21 As you know, the board approved an FY 2007 budget

- 1 request at the October board meeting in Boise. It is our
- 2 plan to send that up to Capitol Hill, the justification for
- 3 the Board's proposals, next Thursday, February 2nd.
- 4 MR. MEITES: Would you remind us what we directed
- 5 you to ask for?
- 6 MR. POLGAR: The total request for the corporation
- 7 was \$411.8 million. The exact breakdown, I don't have in my
- 8 head, but it was \$386 million and change for the basic field
- 9 programs, about \$14 1/2 million for management, \$3 1/2
- 10 million for the Inspector General, and \$5 million for TIG.
- 11 Those were the main --
- MR. MEITES: The 411 million -- how did that
- 13 compare to what we asked for last year?
- MR. POLGAR: Last year, we requested 363 million.
- MR. MEITES: Thank you very much.
- 16 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Any other questions or comments?
- 17 MS. BeVIER: I just have one question of Tom.
- 18 This presentation will be the first time that our
- 19 request or our intended request has gone to anyone on the
- 20 Hill.
- So, you have no -- you haven't sort of given a

- 1 preview to anybody to get an initial reaction on the request.
- MR. POLGAR: Except for a couple of meetings that I
- 3 referred to this morning, at the breakfast briefing, which
- 4 took place yesterday, no, we have not yet previewed it to the
- 5 Hill. One difference between what we're doing this year and
- 6 what we've done in prior years is, in prior years, the
- 7 corporation has sent up the budget request roughly two weeks
- 8 after the President made his budget request. This year,
- 9 we're jump starting it. We're sending ours up the 2nd and
- 10 the President is sending his budget request up on the 6th.
- MS. BeVIER: Thank you.
- MR. FUENTES: Mr. Chairman?
- 13 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Mr. Fuentes.
- MR. FUENTES: I'd like to ask about the protocol of
- 15 that.
- I was taken by that when the comment was made that
- 17 we would be sending our early to the President's, and that
- 18 has not been the tradition of the corporation in the past.
- 19 Is there any down side to jump starting or jumping
- ahead procedurally?
- 21 What is the courtesy or style or protocol of that

- 1 matter?
- MR. POLGAR: Well, in the first place, as I am
- 3 discovering myself this year, getting it out essentially by
- 4 the end of January is a very difficult endeavor. So, I don't
- 5 know why we were sending our budget request up two weeks
- 6 after the President, but I suspect it had as much to do with
- 7 production schedules and the ability to get it done as
- 8 anything else.
- 9 By law, the official budget request for the Legal
- 10 Services Corporation is the one submitted by the -- is the
- 11 recommendation made by the board, not the recommendation made
- 12 by the President.
- So, I don't see any problems with going in advance
- 14 of the President.
- 15 MR. FUENTES: Is there any tradition, experience,
- or knowledge that we have of other organizations, how they
- 17 handle it?
- MR. POLGAR: I believe there are only two other
- 19 organizations in the entire Federal establishment that have
- 20 independent budget submission authority. One is the Federal
- 21 Reserve, and the other one is some small board whose name

- 1 escapes me, and no, I don't know how they handle it.
- 2 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Did we beat Greenspan?
- Any other questions or comments?
- 4 (No response.)
- 5 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Thanks a lot, Tom.
- The next item on the agenda is considering and
- 7 acting on other business.
- Is there any other business?
- 9 (No response.)
- 10 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Public comment.
- 11 Anyone from the public comment want to have
- 12 something to say?
- 13 (No response.)
- 14 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Last item is adjournment.
- 15 M O T I O N
- A PARTICIPANT: So moved.
- 17 A PARTICIPANT: Second.
- 18 CHAIRMAN McKAY: All those in favor?
- 19 (Chorus of ayes.)
- 20 CHAIRMAN McKAY: Opposed?
- 21 (No response.)
