3	CHAIRMAN LEVI: Could I have a motion to
4	approve the agenda?
5	MOTION
6	FATHER PIUS: So moved.
7	CHAIRMAN LEVI: Second?
8	MR. KECKLER: Second.
9	CHAIRMAN LEVI: All in favor?
10	(A chorus of ayes.)
11	CHAIRMAN LEVI: We have all these minutes that
12	apparently I should have been having approved when
13	we've had our telephonic meeting. But we didn't do it,
14	so how about one motion to approve them all?
15	MOTION
16	FATHER PIUS: I move to approve all of the
17	minutes, items 2 through 7.
18	CHAIRMAN LEVI: Thank you. Second?
19	DEAN MINOW: Second.
20	CHAIRMAN LEVI: All in favor?
21	(A chorus of ayes.)
22	CHAIRMAN LEVI: Okay. Wendy, you want to talk

1 about the calendar, or do you want me to talk about the 2 calendar?

3 MS. RHEIN: What you'll find in your book is 4 an initial proposal of a calendar for some activities 5 for our 40th anniversary year. We have overlaid 6 several calendars in there.

You'll see LSC board meetings, important
conferences, dates when Congress will be in session,
which will be important for Washington, D.C.-based
events, of course, and relative holidays that you'll
see on that particular calendar.

12 We're still playing with some key dates around 13 when we might have an event involving the President, 14 when we might have an event that would be considered a more gala celebratory event. So this is just an 15 16 initial attempt at a calendar. If there are other 17 dates that you know of that you would like to add in, 18 specific things we may be missing or ideas you might have for events, please let me know. 19

20 CHAIRMAN LEVI: I think there's two things. I 21 think the September in Washington would be Monday the 22 15th, and it's the 14th/15th/16th, more likely, because

of grantee travel and what have you. If we were having a two-day conference, we're looking at people arriving the 14th, the 15th, 16th, and less at the middle of the week. I know we cleared that on Martha's calendar, and we have it in front of a number of people that matter.

б The other thing, as I have begun to consider 7 the enormity of the task in front of us in terms of making the 40th what we want it to be, it may be that 8 April is too soon to actually kick it off. And I've 9 10 been wondering whether we shouldn't kick it off in Des 11 Moines, Iowa, when in fact it is really right there 12 that it is almost the -- so we'll consider that as we 13 move along here.

But as we get into the discussion of the plan and then what we're thinking about in terms of the year, that may become a decision we should make. So Wendy, I guess, any other comments on the calendar from the Committee? On the phone?

19 (No response.)

20 CHAIRMAN LEVI: Okay. As you know, as a 21 Committee, we authorized or asked the Management to get 22 us registered where we needed to be so that we could

1 actually seek funds. And in a number of states, a few states, at least, that requires a Board resolution. 2 So there are two here, Minnesota and North 3 4 Dakota. So I think we need to probably have separate motions for each. But I would like to have those 5 6 motions right now so that we can get ourselves 7 registered. 8 DEAN MINOW: Can we do them together? 9 CHAIRMAN LEVI: I think we have to do them 10 separately, one for Minnesota and then one for North 11 Dakota. 12 ΜΟΤΙΟΝ 13 DEAN MINOW: So move Minnesota. FATHER PIUS: Seconded. 14 15 CHAIRMAN LEVI: All in favor? 16 (A chorus of ayes.) 17 CHAIRMAN LEVI: Who's moving North Dakota? 18 ΜΟΤΙΟΝ FATHER PIUS: I move that we approve the 19 resolution for North Dakota. 20 21 MR. KECKLER: I second. 22 CHAIRMAN LEVI: All right. All in favor?

1 (A chorus of ayes.)

2 CHAIRMAN LEVI: And I hope we find a really3 big donor in North Dakota.

4 MS. RHEIN: We're working on it.

5 CHAIRMAN LEVI: Okay. So now, Wendy, the 6 truncated version of the development plan?

7 MS. RHEIN: In the interest of time, I'm just 8 going to refer to a couple of points. There is this 9 document in your books. This gives you some initial 10 thoughts, my initial thoughts of, after two months of 11 being on this job, where we're going, areas that we 12 will be focusing on.

13 So just to remind you, you all started this 14 process in January of 2011. I'm sure some of you 15 thought through these things long before that. I've 16 been on the job for just about two months now and am 17 enjoying every single day of it, so thank you for this 18 opportunity.

19 CHAIRMAN LEVI: And I want to say, Wendy was20 in Chicago and we met last week.

21 MS. RHEIN: There is some really good 22 communications work being done across the sector,

1 actually, on some messaging that is coming from funding 2 that's been provided by the Public Welfare Foundation 3 and the Kresge Institute that is beginning to come 4 forth on how the public overall thinks of or, more 5 importantly, doesn't think of civil legal aid.

6 We'll be getting more of that information over 7 the next several months. As John said, I was in 8 Chicago a couple of days ago, and they did an initial 9 review about the key words and values that are 10 resonating with the public.

11 So we'll be able to use some of that 12 information, but the focus on fairness and justice for 13 all are some very important components we're going to 14 want to consider using as we move forward.

Here are some initial thoughts on why to fund LSC -- the unparalleled national reach, fiscal

17 responsibility, and how LSC can help narrow the justice 18 gap. So these are, in particular, the program areas --

CHAIRMAN LEVI: This has become the lightning
round. That went faster than --

21 MS. RHEIN: Hey, I want to get to the names 22 portion of this conversation. So we'll keep going.

After talking to many of you and also talking to the leadership staff at LSC, these are the program areas for which we will be pursuing private fundraising. This gives you a sense of specific areas. This is individuals, foundations, corporations, even in-kind contributions.

7 And as I move forward, I'll be developing 8 buckets of these particular funding areas to be able to 9 have programs at different price points that would fall 10 within these key areas that will allow us to reach to a 11 wide variety of donors.

Over the next couple of slides, I went into some more detail, in particular on some of these initial projects that we're talking about. Leadership training is something that is incredibly important to LSC and to our grantees as well.

Executive director training is something that Lynn mentioned earlier. The high-tech online learning center as an option for private funding. And then also being able to have LSC grantees work with us for compelling stories to be able to reach out to additional funders.

Advancing technology, of course, is something that you all have discussed at length in previous meetings. Being able to optimize some of the TIG innovations that have already come through. Being able to encourage more mobile use and mobile-friendly innovations for the grantees.

Pro bono innovation, of course. The Pro Bono
Task Force recommendations. Matching some of the
funding for the Pro Bono Innovation Fund.

Fellowships is something that is incredibly important to both the grantees and to LSC, and I'm sure to this Board as well, and whether that could be several fellowship programs. The Pro Bono Task Force is working on this particular initiative as well.

15 It could be reinvigorating what was the Reggie Fellows, looking at rural fellows, pro bono placement 16 17 fellows. These are all possible opportunities for private funding, and a good opportunity for high net 18 19 worth individual who may want to provide an endowment 20 for a fellowship opportunity, a named opportunity. 21 Special projects includes funding for the 40th anniversary. We, as you know, will be funding all of 22

1 the events, not just those that would have a

fundraising component but the gatherings that we would have with executive directors and boards, staff functions, others as well. All of that funding needs to be raised. So a lot of the focus will be on raising money, not just for celebratory things, but for substantive programmatic information.

8 And then these are just some of the unique advantages that I think a funder will find interesting 9 10 moving forward, things that I have been very impressed 11 with over the last couple of months. The grantee 12 network. LSC's national standing. The investments 13 that will be able to alter service delivery across the 14 country. Transparency. And the focus on programmatic and fiscal excellence. So these will all be points 15 16 that we'll continue to make with funders moving 17 forward.

18 There are, of course, challenges that have 19 come forward over the last couple of months and that 20 we'll continue to work our way through -- that there 21 are very few foundations right now that are paying 22 attention to civil legal aid, again going back to some

of the messaging work that's being done by the Public
 Welfare Foundation and Kresge.

They're looking also, as funders, to try to find partners to help promote this. And so they've been good touchpoints for me to be able to talk about what funders are interested and how we can continue to talk to national funders about civil legal aid.

8 Programmatically, internally within LSC, 9 fundraising is brand-new. And we're looking at also 10 how we integrate some of these programmatic things like 11 running fellowship programs or enhancing TIG 12 operations, how we might do that programmatically and 13 establish that within the organization as well.

14 Otherwise, we're looking at funders who want to partner directly with -- we're just going to be a 15 16 flow-through organization and provide funding directly 17 to other organizations to run projects or to implement some of the things we want to do. We'll become a 18 19 middleman, and we need to be able to show a national 20 funder that LSC is actually running these projects. 21 There are systems that we're going to be working on within the development office, creating 22

databases, gathering names, vetting potential funders,
 proposal-writing, all of those different systems that
 need to go in place.

The registrations process is a big part of that. Policies and procedures, as you will see at the Board meeting, are also a big part of that. So those are the building blocks that we continue to work on.

8 Then starting from the beginning with 9 individual funders who need to be cultivated, and that 10 will take time -- developing these relationships,

11 working with individual funders to be able to make the 12 case for LSC and to build a relationship, which is a 13 key component, of course, of any kind of individual

13 key component, of course, of any kind of individual

14 fundraising. That process will take some time.

15 Yes?

16 (Inaudible question.)

MS. RHEIN: Not by name. We were just going to talk about foundations, corporations, but not by name.

20 CHAIRMAN LEVI: You had a question? Go right 21 ahead.

22 MR. GREY: Is it all right?

1 CHAIRMAN LEVI: Yes.

2 MR. GREY: Could you go back to the slide, 3 please?

MS. RHEIN: Yes.

4

5 MR. GREY: Just a thought about the word б "transformative" in unique advantages because I think 7 if the work that we do really takes place, that it would be transformative. And I think when you talk 8 9 about people who want to fund things, they like 10 transparency, but they like transformative things, 11 things that are going to absolutely be game-changers in 12 the field that we are in.

13 The other thing, I don't know how you say 14 this, but this idea of standing up the human investment 15 in getting better access to legal services is another 16 term we've got to figure out how to use.

And the point is this, that if all we're doing is recycling the current group of true believers, then we're not going to really achieve what we want to achieve, and that is build an army of people who are really dedicated and intent on making this happen across the country for people who just are unable to 1 make life better for themselves.

2	So if we could figure out how to say that, I
3	think that that would it captures people's
4	imaginations. And you also have to capture their
5	interest in believing that they are part of a bigger
б	force than us and themselves. So I would just
7	encourage that.
8	MS. RHEIN: I completely agree. And I think
9	that's part of what is going to take time in this
10	process
11	MR. GREY: Oh, sure.
12	MS. RHEIN: is the messaging of that and
13	finding the right place for LSC because we are not
14	going to be delivering direct service. So how do we
15	discuss that and at the same time build this wider army
16	of believers, as you said? I think that's part of the
17	communications initiative that I've been talking to the
18	communications staff about as well.
19	MR. GREY: Thanks.
20	MR. GARTEN: There have been numerous studies
21	made of the economic advantages of helping people. And
22	I think that we ought to incorporate that, with

1 appropriate language, in this particular slide.

2	MS. RHEIN: Thank you. I will look at that.
3	So as we move forward, we're thinking of
4	prospects, or I'm thinking of prospects, in four key
5	areas individuals, law firms, corporations, and
6	foundations. And you are all, from fundraising, I'm
7	sure, for other organizations, have some of this in
8	your background, so you will know a lot of this.
9	The important thing about fundraising with
10	individuals is the personal connection, whether that's
11	a personal connection with a member of this Committee,
12	the Board, or even a member of LSC staff. But that
13	initial introduction, that initial contact, will be
14	incredibly important for us.
15	We are of course looking for people who have
16	an interest in justice issues, legal services, poverty
17	reduction, and some patriotic philanthropy, being able
18	to build that army of true believers of people who see
19	the importance of access to justice for all.
20	Interest in technology it maybe a
21	professional interest in technology, someone who's from
22	a startup, someone who may not have thought about LSC

and providing civil legal aid as a tool to be able to
 address a certain social issue that they may have a
 commitment to. And of course we're looking for naming
 opportunities, multi-year commitments, endowments,
 opportunities like that for individuals.

Law firms. These are some natural fits,
potentially, for law firms -- fellowships or pro bono
opportunities, the 40th anniversary event sponsorships,
some naming opportunities.

10 We're very cognizant about not wanting to 11 impact the direct funding that some of the law firms 12 provide to LSC's grantees. That's incredibly 13 important. We're looking at potentially more national 14 partnerships as opposed to individual city by city, not 15 wanting to impact that bottom line.

Also for corporations, sponsorships as well for the 40th anniversary, specific events within the 40th anniversary. Potential in-kind agreements around travel, hotels, technology, hardware, software; those are all opportunities for corporate relationships. May corporations, of course, have private corporate foundations as well as corporate social

responsibility giving opportunities, and another option
 for pro bono support.

Foundations. The focus on legal aid is really 3 So we could work with foundations that have an 4 a tool. 5 interest in domestic violence and present to them б working on civil legal aid as a tool to address the 7 issue that they are currently focusing on -- looking at, as I said, poverty, domestic violence, access to 8 justice, housing, health, the full gamut of social 9 10 issues, and using civil legal aid as the tool which 11 they can use to address that particular issue.

12 Several next steps, just so you know where we 13 are. Continuing the state registrations -- as of 14 today, we have 23 state registrations out of the 38 15 that we need, so that's wonderful. There are several 16 key states that are still in play that we have not 17 heard back from yet, Illinois and California among 18 them.

19 Of course, as you saw from having to approve 20 the individual ones for North Dakota and Minnesota, 21 every state has its own process and has its own time 22 frame in which to go through approvals. So that's been

a daily effort for the last couple of months, following
 up on all of those as well.

Working with staff within LSC to create 3 4 projects in these key funding areas. Looking at creating budgets so we know how much these initiatives 5 б are going to cost. It's going to be impossible to go 7 to some of these individuals, high net worth individuals that we would like engage until we can tell 8 9 them really how much these projects are going to cost. 10 So that's an internal process that will be ongoing. 11 I now have access to a database system for

12 tracking prospects and for tracking our progress with 13 prospects, which is great. 40th anniversary events, 14 sponsorship levels, benefits, all of that is ongoing as 15 well.

And working with you all to create portfolios of individuals or corporations, foundations, that you feel you could make an introduction, that you would feel comfortable going to and setting up or having a meeting with John, with Jim, with me, to be able to launch some of these conversations.

22 That was the quick and dirty version.

CHAIRMAN LEVI: Sharon?

MS. BROWNE: Going back to your foundations 2 3 slide, I know you now have some sort of a tracking system on how to identify different foundations to go 4 And it's my understanding, when you're working 5 to. б with foundations, is that they love education. Let me 7 educate you on certain issues. 8 It seems to me that your focus should be on education when you go to some of these 9 10 foundations -- educating the public on poverty and 11 what's the result of poverty and how we can move out of 12 poverty into some sort of an economic base for people. 13 So I would just kind of suggest that when you 14 look at foundations, you look at their education 15 component that they're going for. 16 MS. RHEIN: That's a very good thought. We'll 17 add that into that list as well. A lot of the foundations, they as well have had cuts in their own 18 19 philanthropic giving, and the program officers want to 20 know, how does this relate to one of my preapproved 21 priorities?

So that's usually a good starting point to

say, well, it's about access to justice, it's about
 poverty, and be able to have initial conversations that
 way as well. So education is a good one to consider in
 that process.

CHAIRMAN LEVI: Julie?

5

6 MS. REISKIN: I think you've done a fabulous 7 job. This is really great. And I appreciated on law 8 firms the caution not to take away from grantees, and I 9 just think we need to be really clear that that's not 10 just about law firms; it'll also be about corporations. 11 MS. RHEIN: Yes.

12 MS. REISKIN: And I know that's true. I'm 13 just saying that for anyone who's concerned or worried 14 that this isn't about -- never has been competing with 15 grantees that would go against our own strategic plan. 16 CHAIRMAN LEVI: I think, actually, the 17 opposite is going to happen. I actually believe if we do this right, it'll be the best thing that ever 18 19 happened for our grantees.

20 Charles?
21 MR. KECKLER: Thank you, John. The only thing

22 I would say is that -- and this good work and a good

plan -- is that I take your point, John, about the time
 and the issue of next April as the beginning.

The only thing is that I think it would be very good from a fundraising perspective to be able to do the event in Washington as opposed to Des Moines because there's 30,000 lawyers in Washington, D.C.

7 CHAIRMAN LEVI: I agree with you. Well, the 8 event is September.

9 MR. KECKLER: Right. But --

10 CHAIRMAN LEVI: Okay. But I agree with you. 11 MR. KECKLER: But the reason is that -- you're 12 smiling about it because, as you're talking about, 13 we're bootstrapping here.

14 CHAIRMAN LEVI: All right.

MR. KECKLER: We are doing this, and if --CHAIRMAN LEVI: We'll just have a 15-month year. That's what we'll do.

MS. RHEIN: There's nothing wrong with that.
MR. KECKLER: Yes. But if we can get that
initial event in Washington, D.C., even if it's a
one-day event, an evening event --

22 CHAIRMAN LEVI: I agree.

MR. KECKLER: -- with sponsorship of tables,
 and raise \$100,000 to help move us forward with our
 other things, that's what I hope.

4 CHAIRMAN LEVI: Yes. I agree. I agree with 5 you, yes.

6 MS. RHEIN: As we look forward to that, we 7 can't start these events without having several 8 significant gifts already made. We're going to have to 9 be able to tell people, we have a foundation gift, 10 whether it's a million dollars or \$750,000, booked 11 before we start asking others for money. So I agree 12 with you. We need to kick it off in a big way.

13 CHAIRMAN LEVI: I agree with that, too. I 14 have to say allowance that the Reggie community, for 15 example, has asked, wouldn't it be nice if we started 16 off with a reunion around them? So there are things 17 like that that are out there.

18 PROFESSOR VALENCIA-WEBER: Could you go back 19 to your statement of need? Okay. I'd like to suggest 20 that when we make the need statement, that we find a 21 way to incorporate there that what we're after is what 22 was promised in the Constitution.

The second sentence -- "Regardless of income, all Americans should be able to seek justice, as promised in the Constitution" -- I say this because people who do not see anything wrong with LSC money being cut or even LSC itself being terminated see it no different than National Endowment for the Humanities or the Arts, or isn't it just a form of welfare.

We must tie it to the most foundational idea 8 that this country has contributed to the whole world, 9 10 that everybody in the Constitution, like it says in the 11 front of the Supreme Court building, of equal justice, 12 equality under the law. And we have to keep reminding 13 people that our biggest job is to make that 14 constitutional right real for the poorest of our 15 citizens.

MS. RHEIN: That was actually something that -- there was a focus group and some survey work that was done as part of this communications effort -- that polled very well, focusing on the Founding Fathers and the Constitution. Those are all elements that polled very, very well, even among those that said, well, wait a minute.

Isn't this just more things for the poor? So keeping
 those ideas will be important for us to have. This?
 No, this is a work in progress.

4 CHAIRMAN LEVI: It's a very good work in 5 progress.

6 MS. RHEIN: Thank you.

7 CHAIRMAN LEVI: And I think there have been 8 some very good suggestions here. I'm mindful of the 9 time because Becky keeps waving at me notes, and one of 10 those is that everyone going to dinner must be in the 11 lobby at 6:15. And Bernie then will coordinate getting 12 us into cabs.

But we have a closed session that's quite important here. So I don't want to cut off this discussion, except that I will in five minutes if it isn't over now.

MS. RHEIN: And please feel free to mull thisover.

CHAIRMAN LEVI: Because we need the closed
 session in order --

21 MS. RHEIN: Mull this over over the next 22 couple of days. You could always send me an email with

your thoughts, or we could have a separate phone
 conversation with thoughts as well.

CHAIRMAN LEVI: Thank you. And our Committee, 3 4 incidentally, the Institutional Advancement Committee, meets every two weeks by phone. We will start to 5 6 publish that calendar for you so that you can know that 7 this is the kind of work we're doing and have 8 confidence. That's the only way you can really launch one of these kinds of years, is to have regular 9 10 meetings. 11 I'm not saying that to the rest of the 12 Committees. Please don't try to compete with that 13 because then you'll really exhaust us. But that's what 14 we've been doing. 15 So, public comment? 16 (No response.) 17 CHAIRMAN LEVI: Other business?
