BROADBAND DETAILS

- o The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 appropriated \$7.2 billion and directed the Department of Agriculture's Rural Utilities Service (RUS) and the Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications Information Administration (NTIA) to expand broadband access to unserved and underserved communities across the U.S., increase jobs, spur investments in technology and infrastructure, and provide long-term economic benefits.
- The result is the RUS Broadband Initiatives Program (BIP) and the NTIA Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP).
- BIP will make loans and grants for broadband infrastructure projects in rural areas. BTOP will provide grants to fund broadband infrastructure, public computer centers and sustainable broadband adoption projects.

WHAT IS BTOP?

- The U.S. Congress has appropriated \$4.7 billion to establish a **Broadband Technology Opportunities Program** for awards to eligible entities to develop and expand broadband services to rural and underserved areas and improve access to broadband by public safety agencies.
- Of these funds, \$250 million will be available for innovative programs that encourage sustainable adoption of broadband services;
 - at least \$200 million will be available to upgrade technology and capacity at public computing centers, including community colleges and public libraries;
 - \$10 million will be a transfer to the Office of Inspector General for the purposes of BTOP audits and oversight.
- Up to \$350 million of the BTOP funding is designated for the development and maintenance of statewide broadband inventory maps.

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



 - ✓ Belief that it's too much work to apply for grants outside historically available money
 - ✓ Fear of failure
 - ✓ Not knowing what you don't know

KEY TO SUCCESS?

- While it might not be your first instinct, *SHARE* your new funding source with others!
- Collaborate on projects, spreading dollars across programs.
- What you share with others will come back to you 10 fold...that's a new philosophical perspective!



WHEN APPLYING FOR GRANTS: TECHNOLOGY INTEGRATION

- Becoming more and more common to include project management and technology implementation, development and integration in grant applications (e.g., OSBF).
- Needed because almost every kind of project / program will have, at a minimum, involvement from IT for laptops, integration with case management, etc..
- Ask for project management and technology integration dollars on every grant application as a TASK not an FTE.
- Asking helps offset the cost of technology AND it incorporates technology as part of the project (versus being seen as something separate).

VENDOR GROUP DISCOUNT INITIATIVE

- Save programs money by pursuing discounts with product and service vendors (e.g., Sprint, Staples, LexisNexis, etc.).
- Team includes ABA, NLADA, NTAP, LSC, legal services program executive directors, IOLTA funder(s) staff
- How do we get this done?
 - Time is significant, especially with local (state) existing responsibilities
 - Staffing and resource planning
 - Quarterly schedule of meetings in 2010 to help push things along
 - Need more people working on different parts
 - Review how we are approaching how we "bundle" or "configure" relationships (e.g., Lexis)
 - Avoidance of analysis paralysis
 - Publishing success stories
